

#7 is Ours!

At the August 14, 2003 Business Meeting, Museum President Brad LaRose reported that Philip Goldman and family have deeded the title to Baldwin Locomotive #7 to the San Luis Obispo Railroad Museum. The 0-4-2RT, 30-inch narrow gauge logging locomotive has been in possession of the museum since November 1998, when it was loaned to the organization. During that period restoration work has been done by members Jim McEntire, Brad LaRose, Jarret LaRose and others. Several local businesses have donated goods and services to the restoration effort.

There is still alot to be done before the #7 can be used for anything other than display. Built by the Baldwin Locomotive Works of Philadelphia, PA in June, 1927, it was exported to Japan where it was operated on the Kiso Forestry Railway until 1958. Philip Goldman purchased the locomotive and returned it to the United States in 1961. If you would like to help with this restoration please send a check to SLORRM, P. O. Outlook Improving for Museum Opening

Because California's financial woes drastically affect the City of San Luis Obispo's ability to fund the rehabilitation of the 1894 SP Freighthouse, the museum Board of Directors is exploring alternative approaches. There is concern that using the present plan, it could be 8 to 10 years until the museum opens.

At the August 14th meeting, Architect Andrew Merriam, a long-time museum member, presented a report detailing his review of the rehabilitation plans for the museum building. Andrew discussed his concepts for cost reduction techniques, including extensive use of volunteer labor.

These techniques could result in substantial cost savings on the

order of one-million dollars when compared to the City's plans, and could be finished with little more than the cash now on hand.

Some details, such as the brick facing on the handicap ramp, and complete removal of lead based paint, would be deferred until a later date, as additional funding becomes available.

Using volunteers for much of the work could reduce the cost to approximately \$600,000, and the building could be occupied in one to one-and-one-half years.

The volunteer program will require significant commitment on the part of museum members to accomplish the opening of the museum. This is an area where the City has had some bad experiences with other groups. It will be up to us to convince them that we can follow through.

A subcommittee consisting of Andrew Merriam, Karl Hovanitz, John Marchetti, Aron Kahn and Arnold Jonas is meeting with City officials to discuss the plan.

After several meetings with City Public Works Director Mike McCluskey and Project Director Peggy Mandeville, it appears that agreement is near.

Working the Polls

On October 7, 2003, the State of California held a special recall election. Nine intrepid volunteers, Richard Alberts, Karl Hovanitz, Arnold Jonas, Gail Jonas, Aron Kahn, Brad LaRose, John Marchetti, Duane Powell and Bill Pyper, staffed Precinct #521 in the Cal Poly University Union.

This was done as part of San Luis Obispo County's Adopt-A-Poll program. For staffing a polling place, a non-profit group like SLORRM is paid \$575.

It was an enjoyable experience for those who participated. The group was given a positive rating by the County Clerk's Office for the performance of their duties.

The Board of Directors voted to offer our services for the Primary Election on March 2, 2004.

Because the County requires that the polling place be staffed by at least 5 people at all times, some of our volunteers worked long hours.

Boxcar needs to be moved: Storage space needed

For many years a wooden narrow gauge boxcar has languished on the grounds of the Dalidet Adobe at the end of Pacific Street in San Luis Obispo.



Built in 1900 by the American Car and Foundry Co., car #1516 was originally purchased by the Florence & Cripple Creek Railroad. From there it went to the Nevada & California, before being bought by the Pacific Coast Railway in 1928.

Election Cancelled

The terms of Board Members Arnold Jonas, John Marchetti, Duane Powell and Bill Pyper expired in January 2004. Requests for nominations were mailed to all paid-up members in October. 2003. As no one else was nominated for election, the Board of Directors appointed the incumbants to new 2-year terms. This action, which is permitted by the bylaws, save the Museum the expense of an election.

The San Luis Obispo Historical Society, owners of the Adobe and the boxcar, have requested that SLORRM take possession of the car and move it from the Adobe grounds.

Naturally the SLORRM Board wants to save this boxcar. Only one problem: We don't have any place to put it. The Sears yard is full. We have to vacate the Ontario Road property next year. If anyone has, or knows about any secure place where we can store this boxcar and other museum artifacts, please contact a Board member.



In addition to needing places to store large items like rolling stock, we also have a quite alot of smaller, perishable goods like books, photographs and small artifacts that need a safe storage place. Currently much of these things are stored in a boxcar on the Ontario Road property. This is not good. If anyone has a dry, secure place, or would be willing to pay the rental on a storage locker, please contact a Board member.




Southern Pacific Scrapbook



Jackson Films to Video

In the Fall of 2000, SLORRM received a donation of 10 reels of 16mm railroad movies taken in the early 1950's by Bernice Jackson, an employee at Southern Pacific headquarters in San Francisco.

In October, 2002, Charles Smiley Presents, a video production company in Northridge, CA, paid the Museum \$1000 to use the film, plus they donated 20 copies of their DVD's to sell and benefit the Museum.

The first video using some of the film is SP Vintage West. It shows scenes of SP activity from 1950 to 1978.
